

P.1) This is a proposal for:

Modification of an existing undergraduate or graduate program, degree, minor, or certificate

P.2) Proposal Summary

With only faculty member to meet student demand for courses in both Hawai'i and Pacific Islands history (currently two separate tracks) – in order to meet graduation requirements within our program we would like to "merge" Hawai'i and the Pacific into one focus area, facilitating student movement through the program in a timely manner (and less overload and independent study expectations upon our faculty member).

P.3) Proposal Rationale/Justification

This program change should allow students to choose "Hawai'i-Pacific" as their focus area within the history major and know that they can move through the program in a more timely manner than if they had to focus more specifically on "Hawai'i" or "Pacific" history courses, which our one faculty member cannot offer enough of each semester/year (while meeting other department obligations). Students will be able to choose both Hawai'i AND Pacific courses to fulfill this requirement (at the 300- and 400-level). This change may draw more majors into the program, knowing that they can get more of the courses they need to graduate, more often.
