

Modification of an existing undergraduate or graduate program, degree, minor, or certificate

### P.2) Proposal Summary

The fundamental change being proposed is in keeping with national trends to offer history majors more flexibility within the focus areas of our program -- allowing students to choose regional or area studies for their focus area (eg. our traditional World, Asia, Hawai'i-Pacific; Europe; US, etc., as we already have), or to choose a more thematic (eg. transnational; indigenous studies; public history, etc.), or interdisciplinary focus (eg. science/medicine/technology and society; gender studies; environmental studies, etc.), or other. A new 1.0 credit course accompanies these changes, in order to assist students in building their focus plan and personal pathway through the major.

We are also removing one GE course from our "Required Courses from General Education Curriculum" for the History major (CS101) and adding one GE course to this listing (IS150) to better serve our students' needs.

### P.3) Proposal Rationale/Justification

The proposed modification in focus areas will benefit students by offering more flexibility to the major, allowing each to graduate with the needed courses more efficiently.

The new 1.0 credit course will help to establish a more cohesive cohort each year, with an emphasis on faculty advising to assist students in meeting all degree requirements in a timely manner.

Students will still be encouraged to take CS101, but it is less of a necessity to our majors now than it was over twenty years ago when this requirement was added to our list of required GE courses for the history major.

The addition of "IS150: Kuleana & Community" represents a further effort to help our students strengthen their connections to UHH, Hilo, and Hawai'i Island as a whole and given its emphasis on mo'olelo (stories, history) the course serves as a strong introductory foundation for our history majors.

These program modifications overall will allow the department to be more nimble in course offerings while at the same time increasing our focus on the student's journey.

Overall, the benefits to the institution include a more vibrant History program that can contribute to recruitment and retention of our students.

These changes should not affect other programs at UHH other than to support enrollment in related disciplines.
