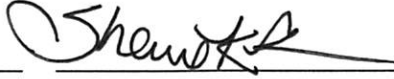

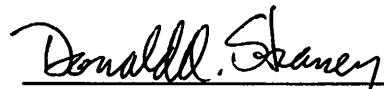
The purpose of this request is to correctly note the approved title of the subject certificate that was approved for a change from "Teaching English as a Second

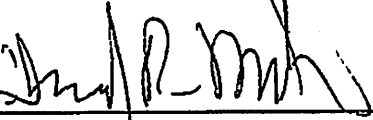

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On behalf of the English Department, I am submitting 5 Course Modifications and 7 New Course Proposals.

These proposals and modifications were formally approved by a unanimous vote of the English Department on September 16, 2009 at 12:17 p.m. In attendance were: Kenith Simmons (Assistant to the Vice Chancellor), David Miller (Division Chair), Jennifer Wheat, Seri Luangphinit (Department Chair), Mark Panek, Matt Haslam, Kirsten Mollegaard, Luke Bailey, Lauri Sagle, Susan Wackerbarth, and Emalani Case.

The proposed changes are a culmination of the program overhaul we initiated last academic year. Per my memo of October 27, 2008, I highlighted the specific rationale behind this cadre of new courses: "The proposed changes have been made with the intent of reinvigorating our major by implementing innovative courses designed to attract new majors. We have also streamlined our curriculum by designing a new core to eliminate redundancies and allow students increased flexibility in choosing their electives. These changes will also allow us to align the Department with national trends in core literary studies."

With national trends and standards as a guide, I plotted the department's current and new courses which are designed to address key specializations. This project was aimed at setting the foundation for future program review and assessment. What became clear in visually mapping the previous emphases was the haphazard progression from 200-400 level courses in certain areas and the lack of any progression in others. The matrix I created exposed gross deficiencies in American Literature and Film, especially at the 400-level. These new courses (in addition to the ones we introduced at the 200-level) now create coherent academic sequences in all of the areas we offer in our curriculum. To avoid inundating the catalog with numbers, many of these classes are based on rotating topics and may be repeated if the content differs. This will allow department members to teach the Harlem Renaissance and the Lost Generation without creating different numbers for each.

Again, per my memo of October 27, 2009, I indicated that *"It is important to note that these changes reflect the ongoing discussion we are already having about further improving program coherence. We are in the process of developing a progression of areas of study (content), faculty expectations, and student learning outcome from the 200 level through the 400 level."* The total sum of these classes now enables this department to undertake an assessment scheme that can draw attention to the comprehensiveness embodied in the diversity of its course offerings. On a side note, I would like to thank Dr. Jennifer Wheat and Dr. Kirsten Mollegaard for their vital assistance in completing this second and final phase of our curriculum revision.

Faculty also expressed a desire for 200-400 level program coherence.
