REQUEST TO MOVE THE HISTORIC PRESERVATION GRADUATE CERTIFICATE SUBJECT:

PROGRAM FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF AMERICAN STUDIES (CALL) TO THE

SCHOOL OF ARCHITECTURE

SPECIFIC ACTION REQUESTED:

We would like to request that the Historic Preservation Graduate Certificate Program (HPGCP) be transferred from the Department of American Studies to the School of Architecture. The HPGCP is a 15-credit-hour program, which may be taken alone or in conjunction with another Graduate Certificate, or an MA or MS, DArch, MURP or PhD degree. The program has been offered since 1986 in the Department of American Studies as a graduate offering open to students from across the university. The certificate program has always been highly interdisciplinary with a structured link to the Department of Anthropology, which shares a required course: Historic Preservation, AmSt 645/Anth 645.

RECOMMENDED EFFECTIVE DATE:

Spring 2023.

ADDITIONAL COST:

No costs are associated with this request.

PURPOSE:

Inclusion of the Historic Preservation program in the School of Architecture will bring the program into conformance with 98 percent of other programs in the country, where Historic Preservation and Architecture are contained within the same administrative units, usually in Schools of Architecture. We anticipate that the Graduate Certificate will experience an increase in student numbers and community exposure as a result of this change.

PURPOSE (cont.):

The Mānoa Planning Committee proposed that the program be moved from American Studies to the School of Architecture. Both the Department of American Studies and the AFS (Architecture Faculty Senate) have voted unanimously in support of this change. In 2020, the Department of American Studies voted to relinquish the program, while retaining the parallel Museum Studies Certificate Program. The faculty recognized that the needs of the state would be better answered if the program was in the School of Architecture. The last director also taught undergraduate courses and electives, including courses cross-listed with Planning, Architecture, and Anthropology.

The present director, William Chapman, holds tenure in the Department of American Studies but currently serves as the interim dean of the School of Architecture. To facilitate the transfer of the program to Architecture Chapman's fallback position will fall back to the School of Architecture.

BACKGROUND:

The Historic Preservation program, in existence since 1986, has always been a multidisciplinary certificate with cooperation across disciplines. Courses were offered in American Studies and in the Department of Anthropology, with cross-listings in the Department of Urban and Regional Planning and the School of Architecture. Urban and Regional Planning, and Anthropology students regularly take courses in the program without always being certificate students. Many of the program's students have come from Architecture as well.

The HPGCP consists of five courses or 15 credits (3 credits per class):

- Two Core Courses (departments typically alternate course offered)
 - o Preservation; History and Theory: AmSt 675/Plan 675/Arch 628
 - o Historic Preservation (Laws): AmSt 645/Anth645/Plan 645
- Two Elective Courses
- One Practicum/Internship Course

The elective courses may "double-count" with electives taken in other programs (another certificate program, a master's or other). Elective courses taken in other departments are subject to approval by the director of the Historic Preservation GCP.

The Graduate Certificate in Historic Preservation is one of two interdisciplinary graduate certificate programs in the Department of American Studies; the other, modelled on the Historic Preservation Certificate, is Museum Studies. Neither program is illustrated in the College of Arts, Languages and Literature's (CALL) or the Department of American Studies' organizational charts. However, it is listed on Page 3 of CALL's Functional Statement. Since American Studies will continue to offer undergradute-level courses in Historic Preservation and we anticipate continuing coooperation on projects and other matters, no change in the Functional Statement is required.

Begun in 1986, founded by national figure William Murtagh, the first Keeper of the National Register of Historic Places, the program expanded in 1993 through the addition of its first full-time faculty member, William Chapman. The HPGCP is managed by a single core faculty member maintaining strong links to other departments, interdisciplinary program. This program is one of 75 programs nationally and one of three in western United States.

Over 150 students have graduated, with an average of eight students graduating a year. As of the spring of 2021, 152 students had received their certificates (between 1988 and 2021), for an average of about eight students a year. The present enrollment is 17, of which 12 are considered "active." The number of students fluctuates from about 10 to 20 enrolled students in any term. Typically, the program has admitted between six and eight new students each term.

BACKGROUND (cont.):

Since 1991, the program has sponsored a preservation field school, which provides practical on-site training. Field schools have been conducted in the Pacific (Micronesia, Guam, Saipan, Pohnpei), in Asia (Thailand and Cambodia) and throughout the Hawaiian Islands. About 30 Native Hawaiian students have been through the program. In 2009, four of the seven graduates were kānaka maoli.

Between 1995-2018, grants totaling about \$900,000 were received over twenty-two years. The program's typical grants were for specific projects for communities or agencies. The National Park Service provided approximately \$50,000 a year over two, five-year periods for the Historic Preservation Field School. The work included researching the history of significant cultural resources within the Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park. Additional grants were secured for recording resources at Kalaupapa National Historical Park and Haleakalā National Park and for recording sites in Saipan and Tinian for the National Park Service.

The historic preservation field is in high demand at the state and national and international levels. Students have obtained jobs in state agencies, the federal government and in non-profit organizations and cultural resource consulting firms.

The State Historic Preservation Division (SHPD) in the Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) has cited the need for further trained applicants. This demand has been a frequent topic in local newspapers and editorials. Demand is also high in other states and in federal programs. There is also international appeal for the program.

At a local level, the program works closely with community-based preservation and educational organizations. These include the Native Hawaiian Hospitality Association (NaHHA), the Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA), the State Historic Preservation Division (SHPD), the National Park Service (NPS), Historic Hawai'i Foundation (HHF), and the Hawai'i Capital Cultural District Coalition (HCCD) (including drafting the basis for the currently proposed Hawai'i Capital National Heritage Area (HCNHA)).

The UHM program is one of the few programs in the western U.S. and the only program in the Pacific. The program is linked through UNESCO to other programs in Asia, of which there is only one other specialized graduate-level program now offered (at Hong Kong University) with several others in the planning stages. Even as a certificate and not a degree program, the UHM program competes effectively with master's programs at the University of Oregon and the University of Southern California in the regional U.S. market and with Hong Kong University, and Deakin University in Melbourne in the Asia-Pacific area. Additionally, there is a fit in Architecture's Asia-Pacific focused dual-degree Global-Track Program with Tongji University, Shanghai.

ACTION RECOMMENDED:

We recommend that the Historic Preservation Graduate Certificate program be transferred from the Department of American Studies to the School of Architecture.
