APPROVAL OF A NEW MINOR IN PHILOSOPHY FOR CHILDREN IN THE PHILOSOPHY

DEPARTMENT

SPECIFIC ACTION REQUESTED:

It is requested that you approve a new minor in Philosophy for Children in the Department of Philosophy.

REQUESTED EFFECTIVE TERM:

Spring 2024

ADDITIONAL COST: None

PURPOSE & RATIONALE:

- 1. What are the objectives of the proposed minor?
- a. Discuss the need for the program.
- b. What kinds of students might be interested in this program? The growing demand for the philosophy for children (p4c) approach to teaching has led to an increasing demand for individuals with more in-depth knowledge and experience in the "philosopher's pedagogy." For example, in Hawai'i, teachers have found that schools, both independent and public, view experience with p4cHI as a professional asset. The minor in philosophy for children program would aid in developing this asset in those with an interest in p4cHI, pre-service teachers, and undergraduates interested in careers in education and/or community outreach.

Educators from across the globe view the University of Hawaii's Uehiro Academy for Philosophy and Ethics in Education as a "premier" location for further developing their knowledge of philosophy for children. The newly launched Progressive Philosophy and Pedagogy MEd in Curriculum Studies, has already attracted graduate students from across the U.S. A minor program would offer a similar opportunity for undergraduates from the mainland with an interest in p4c.

Finally, with its more than 30 years of working in Hawaii's K-12 schools, many students are enrolling at UHM with experience with p4c. A minor p4c program would appeal to students already experienced in p4c while introducing them to more courses in Philosophy and Education that deepen their understanding of p4c theory and practice.

2. How will the minor be administered?

a. Will resources be required to administer this program? (Note that it is expected that existing courses will be utilized.)

The establishment of the Uehiro Academy, with its staff of seasoned p4c practitioners and researchers, has created a much more robust platform for the growth and development of p4c. The Uehiro Academy has five full-time 11-month specialist faculty (three in CALL/Philosophy, two in COE) teaching UHM courses, conducting research, and supporting p4c at K-12 Schools. The Uehiro Academy faculty have already been successfully administering a COE endorsed Undergraduate Certificate in Philosophy for Children Hawaii since 2017 (https://coe.hawaii.edu/programs/philosophy-for-children-hawaii-certificate/). While not a formal university-approved certificate, the p4cHI Certificate has served more than 20 UHM undergraduate and graduate students. Seeking to create a university-approved program, the Uehiro Academy consulted with Cecily Ornelles (Interim Associate Dean) in the College of Education on 11/29/22 and then with April Quinn (Director of Program Development and Review) in the Office of the Vice Provost for Academic Excellence on 12/6/22. The outcome of these consultations was the recommendation to create a Minor Program to replace the p4cHI Certificate for undergraduate students. As with the p4cHI Certificate, the Uehiro Academy would be responsible for any recruitment, advertising, advising, and mentoring associated with the minor program. The Uehiro Academy would also assist the Philosophy Department with any additional administrative or clerical work occasioned by the minor program.

- 3. What is your projected enrollment? How many students are currently served in the major program? Identify the source of students for the proposed program.
 - 5-10 students pursuing minor program coursework per semester. There are three main sources of students to target for the program:
 - incoming UHM students who did p4c in their K-12 schooling: As a result of the decades of
 work done in partnership with Hawaii K-12 schools, there are many Hawaii students who are
 familiar with p4c and want to continue doing p4c in higher education. These students often
 pursue other majors but a Minor in p4c provides a further opportunity for success in a UHM
 degree program.
 - 2) College of Education majors: pre-service teachers enrolled in licensure programs in the COE often don't begin their program coursework until their Junior year and are limited to courses

- that are part of degree programs. The p4c Minor offers these students the opportunity to take courses toward the Minor as freshmen or sophomores, or concurrently with the courses required for their Majors.
- 3) CALL students in other majors: p4c courses have traditionally attracted students from across CALL departments, including Theatre and Dance, Political Science, American Studies, and others. They have also appealed to students pursuing Interdisciplinary Studies Degrees. Such students appreciate the blend of non-professional philosophical inquiry and the focus on pedagogy and applied experience. The p4c Minor appeals to students with an interest in education who do not want to become licensed teachers.
- 4. What foundation courses and prerequisites are needed for acceptance into the minor (e.g., minimum credits, grade point average, work experience)?

The minor consists of 15 credits. Two courses, PHIL 492 Philosophy with Children and PHIL 493

Teaching Philosophy, are required courses for the Minor Program. One additional elective course in

Philosophy at the 200 level or above, is also required. Any UHM Philosophy course at the 200 level or

above satisfies this requirement. kkb 4/25/23

Philosophy with Children (PHIL 492) is an introductory course to p4cH and examines the theory and practice of doing philosophy in elementary, middle, and high school classrooms. Teaching Philosophy (PHIL 493) is a supervised practicum in elementary, middle, and high school classrooms for students who wish to learn how to facilitate philosophical inquiry with students.

The minor program in p4c would also require two elective courses from the College of Education. The emphasis on electives in the College of Education is in recognition of the fact that courses in the College of Education are directly relevant to the background foundation for a career in education that includes philosophy and the philosopher's pedagogy as its central pedagogical approach, as well as specific grade level and discipline of focus. There are elective, undergraduate COE courses offered every semester that satisfy this requirement:

- EDEF 310: Education in American Society (DS)
- EDEP 311: Psychological Foundations (DS)
- EDEP 429: Introductory Statistics
- LTEC 112: Technologies for Academic Success kkb 4/25/23
- LTEC 442: Technologies in Education
- LTEC 448: Social Media- Links to Lifelong Learning
- SPED 304: Foundations of Inclusive Schooling (DS)

There are other elective courses offered by the COE on a rotating basis that also satisfy the requirement for COE elective courses (See attachment A):

The program, through course selection, will allow areas of focus, depending on the candidate's plans. For example, PHIL 493, the practicum, depending on the candidate's plans, will focus on elementary,

middle, or high school placement for the practicum, including discipline specific classroom experience. This will also apply to the electives selected in the College of Education, allowing students to focus on education theory, history, or methods.

5. How many credits will be required for the minor? (Minors require a minimum of 15 non-introductory credits)

6. What is the minimum number of credits toward the minor that students must earn at UH Mānoa?

15

7. How will the program be organized (e.g., first-semester courses, required or core courses, electives)?

Students must take PHIL 492 before PHIL 493, each of which is offered every semester. Any prerequisites for elective courses in PHIL or two elective courses in Education would also still apply. Beyond this, students may take courses for the minor program in any order.

8. Who will have responsibility for tracking, advising, and mentoring students (e.g., program director or staff, individual faculty)? Note that the procedures and requirements for the declaration of a minor are the same as those for a major. Identify the person(s) responsible for advising students and compiling data on enrollment and number of minors conferred.

As noted above, Uehiro Academy faculty will be responsible for tracking, advising, and mentoring students. Primary responsibility will be with the Uehiro Academy Director, Thomas Jackson, and Associate Director, Benjamin Lukey. Assistant Specialist Thomas Yos (CALL/Philosophy) will assist with advising and mentoring, particularly with field-placement and practicum learning. Uehiro Academy COE Specialists, Amber Makaiau and Chad Miller, will assist with tracking, advising and mentoring, particularly with COE course selection.
