Bachelor of Arts in Religious Traditions & Ancient Civilizations, with two tracks: (1) Religious Traditions and (2) Ancient Civilizations

It is also requested that the Bachelor of Arts in Religion, and Bachelor of Classics be subsequently stopped-out pending eventual termination.

This revised memo corrects the proposed degree title and supersedes the original memo dated January 26, 2022.

PURPOSE:

The purpose of the request to amend the degree titles of Bachelor of Arts in Religion and Bachelor of Arts in Classics is to create a single, consolidated degree (Bachelor of Arts in Religious Traditions & Ancient Civilizations), with two tracks: (1) Religious Traditions and (2) Ancient Civilizations.

BACKGROUND:

This request stems from organizational and curricular revisions currently underway in the Department of Languages and Literatures of Europe & the Americas (LLEA). As these revisions were taking place, it was proposed that the Classics Division leave LLEA and join the Religion faculty to create a new Department of Religions & Ancient Civilizations with a consolidated Bachelor of Arts degree. This was agreed upon by both faculties (Classics and Religion) and memos recommended this restructuring and consolidation of both B.A.'s into a single B.A. in Religious Traditions & Ancient Civilizations with separate tracks in (1) Religious Traditions and (2) Ancient Civilizations have been created and are in the process of being approved. This memo, recommending the renaming of the Bachelor of Arts degree and eventual stop-out of the original, separate degrees in Religion and Classics, supports these other reorganizational efforts.

No other programs or campuses within the UH System will be impacted by the proposed changes.

Students admitted in Fall 2022 will be enrolled under the new degree title "Bachelor of Arts in Religious Traditions & Ancient Civilizations" and opt into one of the two aforementioned tracks. Once all students who remain in the stopped-out degrees have graduated, the department will submit requests to terminate the old program names.



SUBJECT: APPROVAL OF RELIGION & CLASSICS B.A. MODIFICATIONS

SPECIFIC ACTION REQUESTED:

It is requested that the proposed modifications to the Classics and Religion B.A. be approved. The result will be a combined B.A. in Religious Traditions & Ancient Civilizations with separate tracks in (1) Religious Traditions and (2) Ancient Civilizations.

ADDITIONAL COST:

RATIONALE/PURPOSE OF PROPOSED CHANGE(S):

We are proposing to combine the currently separate Religion and Classics B.A. degrees into a single degree (Religious Traditions & Ancient Civilizations) with separate tracks in (1) Religious Traditions and (2) Ancient Civilizations. The two tracks are linked by a shared set of “Western” and indigenous theory and methods courses (REL/CLAS 300 and REL/CLAS 304), as well as overlapping required and elective coursework. We have submitted the proposal for REL/CLAS 304, a new course, pending approval.

The tracks proposed remain flexible, but do require students to take coursework in specific focus areas (e.g. literature, history, religious traditions in the Ancient Civilizations tracks). We believe this will add rigor and value to the degree as students move towards careers in education, cultural preservation, law, social work, and more.

There are numerous reasons to support the proposed changes. Specifically, as will be seen from the appended program sheets, approving this degree modification will:

- Support the merger of the Religion and Classics Programs as they form a new Department of Religions and Ancient Civilizations beginning in Fall 2022. The reorganization proposal is now posted on the Manoa Office of Business and Finance.

- Draw upon existing coursework more efficiently, serving both programs due to the overlapping nature of the proposed curricula.
- Make better use of faculty expertise, again due to overlaps in faculty specialization (e.g. in religious studies and ancient languages).
- Allow for exciting innovations to both programs by requiring coursework in “Western” and indigenous theory for both B.A. tracks.
- Create a degree that is more valuable to students due to its broader range of requirements, which will serve students as they enter various professional fields.

Program Sheets for both proposed degree tracks are appended below, as are the proposed changes to current Catalog language.

DETAILED LIST OF CHANGE(S):

The following modifications to the Religion and Classics B.A. curricula are requested:

- The merger of the Religion and Classics B.A. into a separate B.A. in Religious Traditions & Ancient Civilizations with separate tracks in (1) Religious Traditions and (2) Ancient Civilizations.
- The modification of the current B.A. requirements as translated onto the aforementioned tracks (see appended program sheets for details).
- Revised program sheets and 4-year plans for both tracks reflecting the proposed curricular changes.
- Revised Catalog language reflecting the impending merger of Classics and Religion into the new Department of Religions & Ancient Civilizations and their respective undergraduate curricula.

DETAILED LIST OF CONSULTATION WITH IMPACTED PROGRAMS:

Religion courses are currently offered at KCC, LCC, HCC, UH Maui College, and WCC. While we do not anticipate that the programmatic changes outlined in this document will affect these programs, the faculty and lecturers who are teaching religion at these institutions have been informed of the program merger/modification. We will consult further and answer any questions or concerns.

ACTION RECOMMENDED:

It is recommended that the proposed modifications to the Religion and Classics B.A. curricula, resulting in a Combined B.A. in Religious Traditions & Ancient Civilizations with separate tracks in (1) Religious Traditions and (2) Ancient Civilizations, be approved.

Undergraduate Study

Bachelor's Degree

Undergraduate education in religion includes survey courses in Western, Asian, and Pacific religions. There are also thematic courses dealing with such issues as sexuality and death, politics and ethics, and the relationship between religion and other disciplines, such as anthropology, medicine, political science, and sociology.

Requirements

The Academic Program

The Department of Languages and Literatures of Europe and the Americas (LLEA) consists of five programs: Classics (ancient Greek, Latin, and Sanskrit), French/Italian, German, Russian, and Spanish/Portuguese/Latin American and Iberian Studies. Language instruction at the beginning and intermediate levels is offered in French, German, Greek, Italian, Latin, Portuguese, Russian, and Spanish. Advanced courses in composition, conversation, film, and linguistics are offered in French, German, Russian and Spanish. Courses in the literatures of France, the Francophone world, German-speaking countries, Italy, Latin America, Russia, and Spain, are offered in the original language, as are courses in the literatures of ancient Greece and Rome. Cultural studies courses that use a strong interdisciplinary approach and critical interpretive perspectives to consider the politics of representation, culture, and identity include Hispanic Cultural Studies, U.S. Latino Culture and Literature, Indigenous Peoples of Latin America, Latin American Cultural Perspectives, Spanish Cultural Perspectives, Freaks and Monsters, the Ethics of Otherness, French Civilizations, French Culture for Americans, French and Italian Literature as Film. Courses designed to acquaint students from other fields with the traditions and cultures of Europe

and the Americas are also available, both in English and in the target language and in advanced courses in specialized topics: Europeans in the Pacific, French and German Civilization, and Russian Arts and Culture.

LLEA believes that the study of film allows for an array of interdisciplinary considerations ranging from the aesthetics and politics of representation to the socioeconomics of production and distribution. It enriches students' literacy concerning visual arts, narrative, sound, movement and space, at the same time that it provokes their questioning of ethical, critical, social, and moral assumptions. LLEA offers a wide range of courses focusing on the aesthetic and historical development of film in Europe and Latin America: Francophone, German, Italian, Latin American, Russian, and Spanish Film.

The department promotes language proficiency and cultural awareness through its sponsorship of student organizations, films, lectures, scholarships, and Study Abroad programs. Currently, the department supports programs in France (Angers, Annecy, Paris); Florence, Italy; Berlin, Germany; Vladivostok, Russia; and several sites in the Spanish-speaking world.

The Academic Program

The Department of Religions & Ancient Civilizations collectively teaches classes and engages in research relating to humankind's most pressing concerns: the meaning of existence, our beliefs and values, the nature and role of culture, and our obligation to the past and future.

The Department of Religions & Ancient Civilizations is committed to addressing these issues with their students in an intellectually-rigorous but family-like liberal arts environment. We are deeply committed to the success of our students, at both the undergraduate B.A. and graduate M.A. levels, and our curriculum has prepared alumni to succeed in a wide range of fields including students for a wide variety of careers including cultural stewardship, archival work, politics and diplomacy, law, ministerial work, and advanced academic study.

Our department offers a single B.A. in Religious Traditions & Ancient Civilizations with specialized tracks in (1) Religious Traditions and (2) Ancient Civilizations. The curricula of both tracks provide instruction in the content, tools, theory, and methods needed for the serious study of ancient societies and religion. The Religious Traditions track provides insight into specific religions of the world with an emphasis on the religions of Asia and the Pacific, as well as themes relating to religion and its place in human civilization. Students who take this track will be prepared to enter a wide range of careers for which their insight into the human need for spirituality will be a valuable asset. The Ancient Civilizations track trains students to think about ancient cultures from a range of perspectives: historical, cultural, linguistic, and archaeological, with an emphasis on the cultures of the Ancient Mediterranean. This degree track will prepare its students to enter fields relating to cultural preservation, library, archive, and museum work, education, and more.

The M.A. in the Religious Traditions of Asia and the Pacific provides graduate students with training both in the broad theory and methods used in the academic study of religion as well as specialized training in the religions (and language(s)) of these regions. The M.A. curriculum consists of a revolving sequence of 600-level courses on various topics of importance in religious studies, elective courses, and a thesis (Plan A) or special project (Plan B). Alumni of the M.A. program regularly enter high-caliber Ph.D. programs, and have gone on to careers in a range of academic and non-academic fields.
