1.4) Proposal Summary

The overall objectives of the Hawaiian & Indigenous Health & Healing Concentration are as follows:

- To promote the integration of underserved and underrepresented students into an academic and cultural mílieu that supports educational achievement and economic success
- To create a pathway for the dissemination of traditional healing knowledge and skill that will serve as a model for other indigenous groups
- To work towards eliminating health disparities in Native Hawaiian, Pacific Islander and other underserved communities by creating a collaboration between Traditional and Western Medicine

1.5) Justification or Rationale

A key role of the University of Hawai'i is to inspire and train island youth to become the healthcare workforce of the 21st century. Given the present and projected shortages of doctors, nurses, social workers, and health scientists; we must grow our own. specifically, grow our own that are cultural specialists trained capable of engaging with segments of the indigenous community. There are no programs that train students in the traditional healing arts as well as serve as an advocacy or policy arm to guide change. The University of Hawai'i–West O'ahu is well positioned to build a Hawaiian & Indigenous Health & Healing (HIHH) degree program that is community, service and team based. Adding highly skilled Traditional Health Specialists to healthcare

teams in Hawai'i will lead to increased access, better quality and lower costs. For UH West O'ahu, these are the transformative changes needed to overcome decades of health disparities and neglect.

The Hawai'i State Department of Health's 2011 Chronic Disease Management and Control Branch reported life expectancy for the Native Hawaiian population is consistently lower than that of other ethnic groups and was almost 12 years shorter (74.3 years) than the population which had the highest life expectancy (86.1 years) in 2000. Research shows that income is inextricably linked to health, with economic resources as well as social stressors impacting the extent to which people make health promoting choices for themselves and their families and communities. Socioeconomic measures often account for a large part of racial/ethnic differences, which supports increased attention to consideration of both race/ethnicity and socioeconomic factors.

An unrecognized potential in the community is our underrepresented Native Hawaiian and Indigenous youth. They comprise a viable Hawaiian & Indigenous Health & Healing pipeline. By aligning collective ideas, solutions and resources, "Growing our own, from our community, for our community," can be achieved. Training will be community, service and team based, with a primary aim of reconnecting individuals with themselves so that they can connect with the community. Graduates of the HIHH will be able to go directly into the workforce at entry level healthcare and social assistance jobs. This enables UH West O'ahu to meet career needs of the state. As outlined in the State of Hawai'i Employment Projections for Industries and Occupations, projections show that health care and social assistance careers will experience sizable growth of 12.9% from 2014 and 2024, with two out of the top three occupational groups advancing the fastest during this time will relate to the health field.

HIHH students will meet the requirements to enter directly into several graduate programs, including the MPH in HIH in the School of Public health at UHM, as well as other social work and/or healthcare graduate and professional degree programs. Graduate programs for healthcare social worker, mental health counselors, and clinical, counseling, and school psychologists are among the top ten graduate degree occupations with the highest growth. Indeed, within community and social service occupations, the larger workforce segment, which consists of counselors, social workers, and other community and social service specialists, will provide 95 percent of the newly created jobs within the State of Hawaii (State of Hawaii Employment Projections for Industries and Occupations).

Justification is also linked with high priority initiatives of West Oahu as well as the UH System. Specific West O'ahu Stakeholders include communities within 'Ewa, Wai'anae and Wailua:

- 1) Wai'anae & Nānākuli Highest concentration of Native Hawaiians in the world who disproportionately suffer from obesity, cardiovascular disease, diabetes and cancer.
- 2) Kapolei.- Growth of a huge "Second City" with increased housing, young families, crowding, and no parallel increase in infrastructure.
- 3) Waipahu, 'Ewa Beach, Wailua & Wahiawā Old plantation towns with a growing elderly population

Present Healthcare Gaps & Future Knowledge & Skills Needed:

- 1. Knowledge and skill in the traditional healing arts of Hoʻoponopono, La'au Lapa'au and Lomi Lomi.
- 2. Better understanding of Hawaiian culture and values and their role in healing trauma
- 3. Integration of HIHH into a care team to include: Nursing, Social Work, Care Coordination, Counseling, Referrals, Health, Patient Navigation, Coding, Comm. Health Worker, Pharmacology
- 4. Designation and process for reimbursement for HIHH

2.4) Program Description

The Division of Public Administration provides students with the option of earning a bachelor degree in Public Administration (BAPA) with a concentration in Community Health, Disaster Preparedness and Emergency Management, Health Care Administration, Justice Administration, or General Public Administration. A certificate in Disaster Preparedness and Emergency Management and a certificate in Health Care Administration are also available.

Students pursuing the BAPA must take core courses in their area of study, including a capstone course and courses in their respective areas of concentration. It is highly recommended that students consult with a Faculty Advisor before beginning course work.

The Bachelor of Arts in Public Administration (BAPA) prepares students for supervisory and management roles in the public sector. Students will receive a solid foundation in public sector practices and processes complemented by course work in the social sciences. All BAPA students will receive a fundamental understanding of, and appreciation for, public sector management practices and administrative procedures. With the BAPA, students will have the preparation to pursue graduate degrees in varied programs, such as Public Administration, Criminal Justice, Health Care Administration, Urban and Regional Planning, Management Science, Public Health Sciences, and others.

Students who choose to study General Public Administration will be prepared for government service at the local, state, and national levels. For those already working in the field, this program will provide the opportunity to more fully develop management, legal, and behavioral skills for more effective job performance and greater career mobility.

Students studying Community Health will be equipped with a diverse set of skills in the areas of community engagement, community health education and promotion, and community action research necessary for improving the health of communities. Current health professionals may broaden their knowledge of techniques for engaging communities in health across sectors.

Students who chose to study Disaster Preparedness and Emergency Management will be able to demonstrate proficiency in understanding the central concepts of disaster and emergency management and policy.

The Health Care Administration concentration prepares students for supervisory, management, and leadership roles in the dynamic and growing health care field.

Those who choose to pursue the Justice Administration concentration will have the educational foundation to pursue career paths in justice-related fields. Those already employed in the field may upgrade their knowledge and professional skills.
