1.4) Proposal Summary

The BAS-Health Professions (HP) will serve as a bridge to seamlessly advance students from High School & Community College to a Bachelor's Degree, and on to Graduate Degrees (MD, MPH, pre-PT, pre-OT, etc). The aim of the BAS-HP is to introduce UHWO students to a hands-on field of science that combines bio-medical and psycho-social aspects of health, disease and health care in which students will learn and apply existing scientific knowledge to practical applications. Successful completion of the BAS-HS will enable students to apply knowledge of human health to understand life function and improve health. The concentration will build a solid foundation in the Sciences and Humanities to prepare undergraduates for the challenges of pursuing a career in the diverse and ever-changing healthcare industry. Not only will the program will provide students with the knowledge and skills needed in a variety of healthcare settings, but it also provides the opportunity to specialize in a tightly focused career track. The program culminates in a practicum wherein students gain hands-on experience in clinical health care at an affiliated site AND complete a senior project utilizing healthcare data and recent research

1.5) Justification or Rationale

University of Hawaii System – The University of Hawai'i – West O'ahu (UHWO) is the only public university located on the west side of Oahu. UHWO, as an indigenous- serving, land-based campus, has a community-based mission that aligns with the Hawai'i Graduation Initiative goal of increasing the educational capital in Hawai'i. This will be accomplished by the establishment of Early College career pathway coursework and summer bridge programs to high school students to increase and diversify enrollment in the proposed BAS-HS. Specifically, with funding from the Health Career Opportunities Program (HCOP) and in collaboration with the Ike Mauli Ola Program, the BAS-HP is part of a pathway created for student-centered / Indigenous Serving Summer Bridge integrating Culturally-Based Academic Support programs to include Native Hawaiian, Pacific Islanders, and other underrepresented students interested in health careers. The coordinated introductory courses and pre-health professional baccalaureate training is rigorous and comprehensive, and will serve as a bridge to advance students from High School & Community College to UHWO and into career pathways or on to Graduate Degrees.

University of Hawaii West Oahu – There is very strong alignment with UH West Oahu's Strategic Plan 2018 – 2028

1. Po'okela – Excellence: Po'okela is at the center of the UHWO Goals because of the aspirations of our student and faculty, and the needs of our community. With the vision of "Growing Our Own" pipeline to serve the needs of the community and address health disparities, the BAS-HS is dedicated to educate students to attain knowledge and clinical skills to be successful in healthcare professions or clinical practice.

- 2. Kauhale Community: UHWO fosters an inclusive community in which everyone plays a role maintain the health of the community. The BAS-HS offers students the opportunities to share their knowledge and promote health across the life course with our UHWO community and larger West O'ahu communities.
- 3. Hana Lawelawe Service: Participation is key to an evolving society. Hana Lawelawe is part of the structure of BAS-HS as Internships within local community healthcare facilities will be a part of our student's learning experiences.
- 4. Mālama Aina Sustainability: The health and well-being of our kauhale is linked to love and care of land, water, and people. The BAS-HS provides courses and experiences that establish a valuable understanding of the relationship between critical inquiry, healthcare diversity, and clinical care for people in our own community.
- 5. Waiwai Wealth: Waiwai is the capacity to provide and support the goals of students and the aspirations of UHWO as an institution. Funding from HCOP will support the initiation of the Health Sciences summer bridge program, providing a 4-5 year coordinated curriculum of introductory courses combined with upper division health science courses to provide opportunities for students to explore, engage in, and develop knowledge in healthcare and healthcare careers. An additional grant proposal to integrate culture and technology into health science courses was submitted Fall 2018 and will aid research and creative community collaborations.

The United States continues to face a physician shortage that will affect patient care. Locally, a recent study conducted by John A. Burns School of Medicine indicated a shortage of roughly 700 physicians within the state (KHON2, 2018). As the physician shortage worsens, the number of non-physician providers increases. These health professionals include nurse practitioners, physician assistants, psychologists, clinical social workers, and other allied healthcare professionals including physical therapists, occupational therapists, and athletic trainers. According to the Hawaii industry sector website, there is a projected increase in jobs from 2018-2027 showing growth in physical therapy (17%), occupational therapy (17%), and physician assistant (19%) fields. Additionally, the need for healthcare support staff is increasing. As demonstrated by data from Zippia.com, Health Science careers occupies 7 out of the top 10 fastest growing jobs in Hawaii. This information is supported by the State of Hawai'i Employment Projections for Industries and Occupations, with projections that show health care and social assistance careers will experience sizable growth of 17.52% from 2016 and 2026, with two out of the top three occupational groups advancing the fastest during this time related to the health field.

The Bachelor of Applied Science degree provides academic pathways for students in selected Associate of Science programs at the community colleges and complete four-year pathways for select concentrations (FMGT, ISA, SCFS). The BAS requirements (1) assure advanced skills in critical thinking, problem solving, and research, (2) assure proficiency in communication and professionalism, and (3) support the institutional learning outcomes. Within each concentration under the BAS degree, courses are selected to assure students have the knowledge and analytical skills necessary for advancement within the specific field, and to assure students have flexibility in choosing future career paths.

The Health Professions concentration in the Bachelors of Applied Science is a health professions program that offers students a focused, effective start to a career in healthcare. The concentration is modeled on an integrated curriculum that includes foundational courses in the natural sciences, social sciences, and the liberal arts, as well as application-based coursework in

healthcare. The program also offers the opportunity for students to continue their undergraduate education after achieving an associate's degree in a related healthcare or science field. During their senior year, students participate in a Capstone Project intended to broaden and integrate the knowledge, skills, and experience gained from the student's chosen field of study. Graduates are prepared for entry-level career opportunities in healthcare and health-related services or for entry into graduate and professional programs. Students interested in graduate school in medicine, physical therapy, occupational therapy, and physician assistant studies may opt to follow a health professions focus, which includes courses required for entrance into graduate school.

For PUBA - The chair was consulted and approved of the ATP1

For HUM - the Chair was consulted and the Math/Science sub-division chair approved of the ATP1

For SS - the Chair was consulted and added several upper division courses he thought would be appropriate All conversations were verbal, thus no screen shots or memos uploaded.

In regards to other campuses, KCC and LCC have expressed substantial interest in creating articulation agreements to facilitate the transfer of their AS students. Conversations between representatives from both KCC and LCC have taken place and we are moving forward with creating agreements between the campuses. it is important to note that the large number of lower division

science courses under the pre-medicine specialization are required and/or elective courses at LCC for the Biological Tract of the ASNS, thus allowing an appropriate and knowledgeable preparation into the BAS-PHP.

Verbal discussions have occurred between faculty at UHM KRS (AT) and JABSOM (med) in regards to establishing a curriculum that would allow students to be eligible to apply to those departments. While no conversation has occurred yet between a PT school (none in Hawaii) or a Pharmacy school, the concentration curriculum includes all the courses listed on the PTCAS (centralized PT graduate school application system) and Pharmacy professional program application requirements.

Consultation with UHHilo is pending. Phone conversations with Dr. Harald Barkhoff (UH Hilo Kinesiology) and Dr. Misty Pacheco (UH Hilo Health Promotion) are scheduled for the week of November 6.
