The University of Hawai'i – West O'ahu offers students the opportunity to study the cultures of Asia in an interdisciplinary program leading to an Academic Subject Certificate in Asian Studies. This academic credential is included on student transcripts and can be the first step toward employment in a variety of professional and academic fields related to Asia. This certificate will be an excellent complement to our academic programs. It supports our University's strategic plan and mission by providing a certificate option that responds to our unique geographic location. By providing exposure to Asian-focused perspectives, we will be enhancing the educational experience and preparing our graduates to be internationally connected and successful within the Asian region and beyond. The certificate also represents our commitment to diversity, a hallmark of our strategic plan, in being an inclusive campus that is responsive to Hawai'i's multicultural community.

First, from an academic viewpoint, is in the interests of our students to list the Certificate on official transcripts, particularly as they apply for jobs and for graduate and professional programs. Students can pursue the certificate in order to develop a secondary area of specialization that enhances their major. For example, a student might wish to complement a Business or psychology degree with this certificate, which demonstrates more specific knowledge related to Asia. By recognizing this program on transcripts, we will help these students convey the full picture of what they learned and accomplished at UHWO.

Recognizing the Certificate is also in the interest of UHWO as a means of recruiting new students. From a recruitment perspective, the ability to combine a major with a certificate might prove attractive to prospective students, particularly those with interests in areas where UHWO does not yet offer a major. Special note should be made of the ethnic backgrounds of our students. About 40% of UHWO students are from Asian ethnic groups. Therefore, this certificate can be very meaningful for many students to learn about their heritage.

Next, due to the increasingly global environment of business, persons with an understanding of Asian cultures are in demand. Asia is home to nearly 60 percent of global GDP, some of the world's fastest-growing economies, half the world's population, and an expanding middle class, and so offers great opportunities for U.S. firms and workers. This certificate will be useful to students who will work in Hawai'i after graduation, given the prominence of international visitors in the tourism industry. In Hawai'i, about one in six visitors (18%) came from Japan (1.5 million in 2013) while there were 125,000 Chinese tourists and 177,000 South Korean visitors, combing to make up about 3.8% of all visitors, with the number rapidly growing.

Last of all, almost every other 4-year university in the state of Hawaii, along with two community colleges (Kapiolani and Honolulu) offers an Asian studies or international studies major or certificate, underscoring the importance of Asia-related curriculum. UH West Oahu is the only public university in the state that does not have an Asia-related certificate and so an Asian Studies Certificate is a way to encourage students to pursue Asia-related studies at UHWO. We would like to provide students on the West side of the island, as well as our online neighbor island students, the opportunity to pursue an Asian studies certificate.

A. ASIAN CONTENT COURSES (12 upper division credits)

- All credits must be upper division
- Courses must come from at least two different concentrations
- At least 9 credits must be taken at UHWO (that means three credits can be taken at another university)

B. PRACTICAL TRAINING (3 CREDITS)

Do ONE of the following two requirements

1. INTERNATIONAL-RELATED PRACTICUM: an internship in an Asian country, a domestic internship with an Asia-related corporation, a domestic internship with extensive contact with Asian clients or service learning project with an Asian component (i.e. work with Asian immigrants). A senior practicum can fulfill this requirement.

STUDY ABROAD OR OVERSEAS FIELD TRIP: 2-week minimum time spent outside
the United States in an Asian nation (in East Asia, SE Asia, or South Asia). A senior
project or directed readings class with a travel component may also count. This must be
the equivalent of at least 3 semester credits. Personal vacations that do not count for
college credit cannot fulfil this requirement.

C. ASIAN LANGUAGE REQUIREMENT

- A student must show proficiency in an Asian language equivalent to or better than having finished the 2nd semester of a 2nd year college language course (i.e. JPN 202).
- A student can show proficiency through a transcript showing the student has finished the
 second year of an Asian Language course with a grade of "C" or higher, or by providing
 a certificate or letter showing the results of a placement test at a recognized university or
 college language testing facility. Native speakers of an Asian language can show
 proficiency by certifying their native speaker status. It is the student's responsibility to
 obtain this documentation.
- For the first five years of this certificate, the requirement may be fulfilled by achieving beginning proficiency in TWO Asian languages equivalent to or better than the first semester of a first year college language course (i.e. Korean 102 AND Chinese 102, or llocano 102 AND Japanese 102).²

A grade of "C" or higher is required for all courses in the certificate.

The reason for this option is because many institutions do not have 2nd year language courses like Korean 201 or Chinese 201 due to lack of enrollment. Therefore, until programs get a sufficient enrollment of students who can move onto the 200 level language courses, students could take one year of two Asian languages to fulfill this requirement.

FAQ (frequently asked questions)

What is the Asian Studies Certificate?

The University of Hawai'i – West Oʻahu offers students the opportunity to study the cultures of Asia in an interdisciplinary program leading to an Academic Subject Certificate in Asian Studies. This academic credential is included on student transcripts and can be the first step toward employment in a variety of professional and academic fields related directly or indirectly to Asia.

The term "Asia" is of Western origin, but for the purposes of this certificate refers geographically to the Far East (China, Japan, and Korea), South East Asia, and South Asia. Although the term is vague, the economic and cultural influence of Asia is real. Due to the increasingly global environment of business, persons with an understanding of Asian cultures are in demand. Asia is home to nearly 60 percent of global GDP, some of the world's fastest-growing economies, half the world's population, and an expanding middle class, and so offers great opportunities for U.S. firms and workers. This certificate will be useful to students who will work in Hawai'i after graduation, given the prominence of international visitors in the tourism industry. In Hawai'i, about one in six visitors (18%) came from Japan (1.5 million in 2013) while there were 125,000 Chinese tourists and 177,000 South Korean visitors, combing to make up about 3.8% of all visitors, with the number rapidly growing.

Benefits

The Asian Studies Certificate is a great enhancement to any undergraduate degree. One can:

- 1. Gain a broad, knowledge-based introduction to Asian Studies
- 2. Demonstrate college-level basic fluency in reading, writing, and speaking an Asian language.
- 3. Be able to apply knowledge of Asia to real life workplace or educational settings.
- 4. Demonstrate an understanding of Asia's cultural heritage.

Please explain the approach taken in creating this certificate

The Asian Studies Minor at UH Mānoa was one of the key models for this program. It required 15 upper division credits of Asia related coursework. There is no language requirement for the minor per se, but 2 years of language is required for most UH Mānoa students as part of general education. Our approach is similar –12 upper division credits of Asia-related coursework (along with 3 credits of a Asia-related practicum or study abroad). These courses will help expand the student's knowledge and understanding of the Asian cultures. Rather than to require students to take specific courses, students can choose from a range of courses to ensure flexibility. Students will also have to choose courses from at least two different disciplines to ensure breadth of Asian Studies.

As for a language requirement, we also looked at the Asian Studies certificates at Honolulu Community College and Kapiolani Community College. Both community college Asian Studies Certificates required 2 years of an Asian language, and so a proposed UHWO certificate should

at least do the same. The language certification policy was based on HCC's Asian Studies certificate. By the end of the two-year target language, students are expected to be able to handle daily situations such as greetings, shopping, directions, carrying out basic conversations, or handling transportation situations.

A practical training requirement was chosen to help impart skills for careers with an Asian component and complement the theoretical perspectives offered in the other courses. Students can do a practicum to apply their knowledge to real life situations. Or, students, if they wish, could take advantage of various study abroad programs offered by other institutions such as Hawai'i Tokai International College's study abroad program, Leeward Community College's summer program, or UH Mānoa's study abroad center programs in Japan or China.

Why are students allowed to fulfill the language requirement by achieving proficiency in TWO Asian languages equivalent to or better than the first semester of a first year college language course (i.e. Korean 102 AND Chinese 102) for the first five years of this certificate?

- 1. Students can still fulfill this requirement by showing intermediate college proficiency (two years' worth of study) in one language, such as Japanese.
- 2. At the moment, UH West Oahu does not offer Asian language courses and so students can take them at other institutions like Hawaii Tokai International College (our next-door institution), community colleges such as Leeward Community College, or at UH Mānoa. However, at many institutions, languages such as Chinese or Korean do not have a sufficient number of second year classes, due to insufficient enrollments. Therefore, students can show first year proficiency in two Asian languages until there are sufficient numbers of students who can enroll in the 2nd year language classes. After five years, we expect there to be sufficient numbers of students.

How can one test out of the language requirement?

UHWO does not have currently have language testing facilities to evaluate a student's language competency. A student can show proficiency through

- a transcript showing the student has finished the second year of an Asian Language course with a grade of "C" or higher
- by providing a certificate or letter showing the results of a placement test at a recognized university or college language testing facility.
- Native speakers of an Asian language can show proficiency by certifying their native speaker status.

It is the student's responsibility to document their ability if they choose to test out of the language component.

Is the international related practicum separate from a senior practicum or could students use their senior practicum for the certificate?

The international-related practicum could be the senior practicum (with an international component) or a separate practicum. So a student could use the senior practicum as part of the certificate if it involves working with an international-related company or international clients. This could also be a service project involving clients such as immigrants.

How does one define "study abroad"?

The study abroad requirement shall be at least a minimum of two-week study abroad field trip, for a minimum of 3 credits. Personal vacations that do not count for college credit shall not count toward this requirement.
