The Certificate in Music provides UH West Oʻahu students with an opportunity to improve skills and gain knowledge in four areas of Music: Music Performance; Music Theory and Music Writing; Music Technology; and Music History and Literature. Students will benefit from a diverse set of experiences designed to enhance musicianship in traditional and contemporary music ensembles, encourage music creativity, and foster a better understanding of music's role in our world. Students desiring life-long participation in community ensembles will find the Certificate in Music useful as a bridge to post-college music-making. Graduates of the Certificate in Music will also be better prepared to incorporate Music into their career pursuits. Elementary educators, for instance, incorporate Music into their classroom teaching; Business/Marketing graduates use their knowledge of Music Literature to support an effective advertising campaign; and Creative Media majors use their practical skills in the recording studio to reinforce the impact of a film or documentary.

Main Objectives for the proposed Certificate in Music:

- To increase music education opportunities at the college level for the Leeward Coast and Central O'ahu communities.
- To contribute to the cultural heritage of our communities by enhancing students' music-making skills in traditional and contemporary music ensembles;

- To encourage creativity in music in a process that exposes students to industry standard technological tools;
- To foster a better understanding of music's role in our world;

Proposed Curriculum for the Certificate in Music

Consistent with the above Main Objectives, the Certificate in Music curriculum presents four (4) areas from which students choose three (3), in which they earn a minimum of six (6) credits each. In order to graduate with the Certificate in Music, students must maintain a grade of "C" or better.

Students choose a total of 18 credits with a minimum of 6 credits from 3 of the following 4 Areas:

The UH West O'ahu Humanities | Music program has built up resources enough to offer the Certificate in Music without requiring immediate additional resources.

4. Justification or rationale for program action (deletion or addition)

There is high regional community demand for such a program and increasing legislative support (see Senator Will Espero's August 2, 2017 column in the *West O'ahu Voice*, "West O'ahu Poised to Lead in Culture and the Arts"; and Sen. Brian Taniguchi's statement as Chair of the Committee on International Affairs and the Arts Hawai'i State Senate (2016-17) ¹).

Our Leeward Coast/Central O'ahu region has grown dramatically in learning opportunities in many fields since our campus' 2012 opening. Degree opportunities in Music, however, have not kept pace. In Fall 2015 there was an effort to revive the long-defunct Wai'anae High School Band program, and during that same fall, Dr. Jon Magnussen hosted the students and director of the fledgling band at a UH West O'ahu campus Library concert performed by professional Chamber Music Hawaii musicians. Without a regional Music degree at the University level, the students in the band have only one choice to continue their band experience in the UH System: they must go to UH Mānoa. And there is much evidence to suggest that the hardship of fighting the #1 worst traffic in the U.S. keeps many Leeward Coast students from going to UH Manoa and achieving their dreams.

Music on our UH West O'ahu campus also plays a transdisciplinary role by helping solve some of the vexing societal issues that persist in our communities. For example, in Spring 2017 the UH West O'ahu Humanities|Music program collaborated with Leeward Community College's Music classes in Carnegie Hall's nation-wide Lullaby Project where parents and parents-to-be were paired with songwriters in a creative afternoon that yielded original lullabies for their children. These lullabies were then arranged and performed by students in a moving presentation. The event helped create positive feelings around the new life changes of the participants -particularly for new single parents whose self-perceptions were not always positive - and supported their resolve to fully embrace parenthood. Another innovative alternative learning opportunity has been the Summer Music Works program that promotes high school graduation, college readiness and music creation through songwriting among high school musicians. Initially offered to students on the Leeward Coast of O'ahu in summer 2012, the program has expanded to other Title I schools and provides an awareness of skills helpful for success in college and in life, supports the growth of new musical talent at the pre-college level, and shows students potential career paths in music. Another learning opportunity is the Humanities|Music program's Ho'okani Kulanui partnership with the PIKO Project. This bi-semester activity brings a well-known Hawaijan music artist to our campus to kanikapila with our classes, combining community

engagement with a learning opportunity for our students, giving them first-hand experience of what the *kanikapila* tradition is. This transdisciplinary approach to our Music curriculum increases dynamic learning and teaching, discovery and innovation, and engages our University with our community.

By building a regional Certificate in Music, our campus is helping to build up a regional music education pipeline from pre-k through college. This increase in music education opportunities at the college level on the West side of the island gives students from the Leeward Coast and Central Oʻahu—where the majority of Oʻahu's population resides— a Music option in their region. Additionally, as an indigenous-serving institution, our campus plays an important role as the gathering place for our West side community—the largest concentration of Hawaiians in the state— as a major contributor to the cultural heritage of our community.

The proposed Certificate in Music also strengthens our campus' liberal arts foundation. As one of the seven liberal arts, music in ancient Greece was an integral part of a general education. Today, Music study is well known to promote qualities that employers desire: attention to detail, a strong work ethic, and an ability to work well with others. In fact, offering the Certificate in Music will arguably help all of our general student population become more employable in their chosen careers. By attracting more music students to our campus, the Certificate in Music helps build our university ensembles (i.e., University Band, University Choir, Hawaiian Ensemble, University Strings, etc.), further developing the above skills in all participating students. Research suggests another corollary benefit: the arts contribute to increased levels of student persistence in school.





How many different UH West O'ahu Music classes have you taken? 62 responses




Should UH West O'ahu establish an 18-credit Music Certificate or Minor?




Should UH West O'ahu establish a 50-credit Music Concentration or Major?




What Music STYLES/GENRES should the program focus on?




For the above question, what other Music STYLE/GENRE do you suggest? (optional)


