- a. The Concentration in Community health is aligned with the Campus and UH system mission, strategic plan and facilities plan in the statements listed below. The Concentration in Community Health:
 - i. Has a community-based mission to provide training and service learning experience to students who live and work on the west side of Oahu, surrounding areas, and neighbor islands via distance learning.
 - ii. Has an applied focus of community engagement through practical applications and service learning with community partners.
 - iii. Has a hybrid structure to complement distance learning to invite and accommodate students.
 - iv. Has leadership and management tenants embedded in course offerings to anticipate growing community health workforce needs on the west side of Oahu.
- b. The Concentration in Community Health has the potential for articulations across UH campuses in the following manner:
 - i. Potential to provide course offerings to community college transfer students from other UH system community colleges (Leeward, Kapi'olani and Maui) to complete credits towards a 4-year degree, BA PUBA with a concentration in Community Health (2+2, or 3+1).
 - ii. Potential course offerings for students to matriculate into graduate programs at the University of Hawaii at Manoa and UH-Hilo.
 - iii. Continue Early College career pathways with local high school.

4. Justification of need

The needs of the U.S. healthcare workforce are rapidly changing, as are healthcare needs in Hawaii for more individuals to be trained in delivering health care education at the community level. Data gathered from the U.S. Bureau of Labor statistics states that the overall employment of health educators and community health workers is projected to grow 16 percent from 2016 to 2026 (Occupational Handbook, Community Health Educators, 2016). This growth is much faster than other health occupations and is driven largely by efforts to improve health outcomes and to reduce healthcare costs by teaching people healthy behaviors and explaining how to use available healthcare services (Occupational Handbook, Community Health Educators, 2016). Moreover, this fast paced employment growth will result in the creation of 19,200 more jobs by 2026.

Nationally, industries with the highest concentration of employees as community health educators include grant-making and giving (2,190), outpatient care centers (5,040), social advocacy organizations (1,170), other ambulatory health care services (1,390), and community food and housing and emergency and other relief services (510) (Bureau of Labor Statistics, 2016). As employment rates in this industry rise, an increase in Hawaii's healthcare workforce also means that Hawaii's healthcare education system needs to be modified to ensure that there is an adequate supply of trained community health educators to meet healthcare needs in Hawaii. Community health educators need a least a bachelor's degree. In order to meet healthcare industry needs, there is a need for more trained health educators with 4-year degrees.

The Bachelor of Arts in Public Administration degree with a concentration in Community Health provides students with a diverse set of skills in the areas of community engagement, community health education and promotion and community action research, which are paramount in the field of community health. Developed as a hybrid concentration, Community Health is geared towards aspiring community health workers, health education specialists, working health care professionals and distance learners interested in health education-related careers. This program provides the opportunity for students to receive training in becoming leaders in the field of community health, promoting health, advancing health equity, and improving health in the communities in which they live, learn, work and play. Community Health prepares students for careers in promoting healthy behaviors, assessing, planning, implementing and evaluating

5. Demand for the program

Across Hawaii, healthcare organizations are making staffing a top priority. Healthcare organizations are taking a closer look at meeting one of the most essential needs in healthcare education, prevention. A balanced geographic distribution of healthcare providers is needed now more than ever to deliver preventative healthcare information to those who need it. Community health educators meet the demand for trained and potentially licensed health education specialists who deliver education on preventative care. Health educators are employed in a variety of settings, including hospitals, nonprofit organizations, government, doctors' offices, private businesses, and colleges. In the state of Hawaii, community health educators earn an average of \$55,010 (480 employed; \$60,070 in Honolulu) (Hawaii State Dept. of Labor and Industrial Relations, 2016), which is on par with student demand for wages after graduation.

The most recent report from the Beaumont Foundation and its National Consortium Health Workforce development calls for community health employers to zero in on the skills development that helps workers' engage more broadly and effectively across their communities and across sectors. These skills include effective communication, developing partnerships that broaden impacts, and engaging in the development of policies that make communities healthier. (de Beaumont Foundation, CEO Ed Hunter). Eight areas for building such a workforce include:

- a. Systems thinking
- b. Change management
- c. Persuasive communication
- d. Data analytics
- e. Problem solving
- f. Diversity and inclusion
- g. Resources management
- h. Policy engagement

The Community Health Concentration in the PUBA Division at UHWO is well situated to prepare our future healthcare workforce with the skills needed to help make communities healthier. This concentration will address the 8 areas above and new skills that compliment traditional skills in community health found among the U.S. healthcare workforce.

6. Non-duplication of programs

- a. Public Health: BA, MPH, MS, Dr PH, PhD- The Bachelor of Arts degree in Public Health at UH-Manoa is designed to educate undergraduates interested in public health and/or health profession training in the broad basic concepts in public health education, practice, and research. The primary focus of public health education is to improve health and quality of life through the population-based prevention and treatment of disease and other physical and mental health conditions, through surveillance of cases and the promotion of health behaviors.
 - i. Program above does not include leadership or management in the field of community health, which are components specific to the Community Health Concentration in the Division of Public Administration at UHWO.
