



Subject: Proposed A.A. in Liberal Arts Degree with a Concentration in Economics

1. **SPECIFIC ACTION REQUESTED:** Approval of a Concentration in Economics

Program Description:

The A.A. Degree in Liberal Arts with a Concentration in Economics prepares students to transfer to four-year institutions. This 60-credit program satisfies all of the requirements for the A.A. degree in Liberal Arts. Additionally, the program imparts students with solid knowledge and skills toward a Bachelor degree in Economics. After successful completion of the program, students will have a strong understanding of the field of Economics, and good foundational knowledge of the research methods and statistics used by economists, as well as a clear sense of the major perspectives, which define the field of Economics. Targeted advising and a carefully planned course sequence will enable students to successfully transfer to baccalaureate institutions in Hawai'i that have Economics majors, such as the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, the University of Hawaii West Oahu, the University of Hawai'i Maui College, and the University of Hawai'i at Hilo, or to any other four-year university.

Program Learning Outcomes for the Liberal Arts Degree:

1. Make effective decisions with intellectual integrity to solve problems and/or achieve goals utilizing the skills of critical thinking, creative thinking, information literacy, and quantitative/symbolic reasoning.
2. Ethically, compose, convey, and interpret varied perspectives with respect to an intended audience using visual, oral, written, social, and other forms of communication.
3. Evaluate one's own ethics and traditions in relation to those of other peoples and embrace the diversity of human experience while actively engaging in local, regional, and global communities.
4. Through various modes of inquiry, demonstrate how aesthetics engage the human experience, revealing the interconnectedness of knowledge and life.
5. Explore and synthesize knowledge, attitudes, and skills from a variety of cultural and academic perspectives to enhance our local and global communities.

Student Learning Outcomes for the Concentration in Economics:

1. Explain how the American economic system works, including various approaches to the organization of production and the allocation of resources.
2. Explain how policies of microeconomics nature achieve national and specific goals of public policy.
3. Explain the specific tools of classical, Keynesian, and macroeconomics analysis, e.g. demand and supply, the consumption function, the multiplier effect, the quantity theory of money, and the accelerator effect, all of which analyze the change in and determination of national income.
4. Explain government fiscal and Federal Reserve policies and apply these to current economic events.

2. **RECOMMENDED EFFECTIVE DATE:** Fall 2017

3. **PURPOSE:** The purpose of the Concentration in Economics is to create a clear, seamless pathway for students interested in transferring to a 4-year institution with a Bachelor's degree in Economics.
4. **BACKGROUND AND CONSEQUENCES:** In February 2015 and again in May 2015, the Social Sciences Department at Kapi'olani Community College (KCC) met with the Dean and faculty of the Social Sciences at the University of Hawai'i at Manoa (UHM). The discipline-level conversations led to pathway clarifications, which led to the present initiative. KCC only offers three Economics courses – ECON 120, 130, and 131 – and the UHM (and many other universities') Department of Economics accepts only two of these three courses as credit toward the B.A. in Economics. As such, the Concentration in Economics is being developed to respond to the needs of students interested in an Economics major, who would like to transfer to a four-year institution and beyond. The A.A. Degree in Liberal Arts with a Concentration in Economics will allow students to: 1) complete the introductory Economics courses, thereby allowing them to declare their major upon arrival at a four-year institution; and 2) fulfill the B.A. Degree in Economics language requirement. The Concentration in Economics will help students interested in an Economics major to complete their degrees in a timely fashion, and also aligns with the Memorandum of Agreement established between Kapi'olani Community College and the University of Hawai'i at Manoa. 
