Prerequisite: KHAW 303 or permission from instructor. (Designed for Hawaiian immersion students and students with appropriate language proficiency.)

- 2. Use a genealogical approach to history that is inclusive of similar historical progressions and developments occurring at different absolute dates;

Writing Requirements

A sample of writing assignments include:

- Two 4-5 page response essays, written in response to a specific question (based on reading assignments or class presentations). Essays must be computer generated, well-thought out, proof-read, and have a thesis.
- Review essays (2-3 pages) of the assigned material that examine important aspects of world history, in combination with a Reaction Journal that highlights the key points and critically analyzes the readings within the historical context. The Journal should be 1-2 typed pages per class and is due at the end of the semester.
- Three handout assignments of five pages each requiring analysis of historical documents.
- Four short essay assignments (2 pages each) based on questions comparing and contrasting historical primary source material.
- Two response essays (four pages each) that address questions related to specific primary and secondary source readings. These essays include a mandatory revision.
