#### 5. Course Outline:

The curriculum offers and introduction to the nursing and allied health professions in a context of didactic and field exposure. This class may also give insight to the preparation for the student to achieve a level of knowledge, skills, and abilities essential to provide basic care to ill or disabled persons. These skills entail, but are not limited to, obtaining vital signs, bathing, grooming, positioning, toileting and ambulating. Additional topics include legal rights, communication using medical terminology, safety, observation, reporting and assisting individual residents in maintaining basic comfort, ambulation/transfer techniques, nutrition and feeding specific to the elderly population. Teaching methodologies include lecture, in-class seminars and lab.
