iv. Description of demand and social value of the program

The windward side of the island of O'ahu is statistically shown to have one of the highest populations of Hawaiian students. Many of high schools with bands and music programs specifically Hawaiian music programs. Castle High School alone offers 5 Sections of Polynesian music each semester. These programs are currently untapped by Windward CC. With a certificate in Hawaiian Music we can make our campus very attractive to those students within these high schools who are taking Polynesian Music. As of right now, we can only offer that they can come and learn music from us and get some elective credits. With a certificate, we will be able to go to these schools, explain our certificate offerings and show a Hawaiian music

pathway for those students who have already committed quite a bit of time and energy to learn music at pre-college levels.

Having a certificate also positions us to be able to apply for funding, grants, and scholarships that will provide opportunities for our students. Right now, with no music deliverable or outcomes we are very limited in what we qualify for and our requests for funding will probably be viewed as non-essential or extracurricular.

The social value of the program comes with the territory of music programs. There are great opportunities for intergenerational knowledge transfer in our music program. Our students have had the opportunity to perform with treasured Hawaiian musicians and recording artists such as Cyril Pahinui, Palani Vaughan, Jerry Santos, Amy Hanaiali'i, Ledward Ka'apana, Dennis Kamakahi and many more. This has helped to connect our students to the culture of this place that they currently call home. It has also inspired many of them to pursue careers in music. Music is a great outlet for students to discover self-identity and as a means of expression for those students that has a platform for their voice and thoughts to be heard. Hawaiian music itself is very valuable for students to be able to access a large portion of our oral histories. This certificate would help to preserve and perpetuate this Hawaiian art form.

v. Description of resources needed, including budget, personnel, and facilities. If none are required, how will existing facilities and equipment be utilized?

We would need to hire a minimum of 1 (Possibly 2) music lecturers in order to offer the classes needed so that students can graduate within a two-year time frame. As far as resources, budget, and facilities, we would be able to function within our current model.
