#### i. Catalog Description of the Program

The Foundation in Acting is a one-year intensive workforce preparation program for performers intending to pursue a career in the entertainment industry on stage or screen.

#### ii. Program Learning Outcomes

After completing this program, graduates will:

- Demonstrate competency in various approaches to acting and performance for both live stage productions, and for new media productions.
- Portray roles in classical and established productions as well as originate roles in newly devised scripts.
- Demonstrate control, strength and nuance in both voice and physicality for theatre and media.
- Navigate the various access points of the professional entertainment industry.

#### iii. Courses connected to the Program

## **THEA 101 (Introduction to Drama and Theatre)**

3 credits

An introduction to the art of drama and theatre. Students study selected plays that are representative of important playwrights and historical periods. These plays are studied in their historical context and provide a basis for understanding elements and styles of drama. Theatre production will also be explored by considering the functions of actors, audiences, designers, playwrights and technicians.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Discuss the origin and development of the theatre from its beginnings to the present.
- 2. Discuss the theatre's influence and importance in human culture.
- 3. Compare and contrast dramatic literature and global theatre practices throughout history.
- 4. Analyze the artistic choices and techniques used to transform a written dramatic script into a performed work presented to an audience.

#### THEA 133 (Stage Combat Workshop Level I)

3 credits

Introduction to theatrical stage combat with assorted weapons. May be repeated up to 9 credits.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Correctly define stage combat specialized terminology and concepts.
- 2. Execute theatrical fight techniques.
- 3. Choreograph and perform staged fights.

### THEA 200B, C, D (Beginning Theatre Practicum) x2

1 credit (x2 = 2 credits)

Beginning workshop experience in the practical application of theatre skills: (B) acting. THEA 200 is repeatable up to four credits in each alpha. Pre: for 200B, audition and performance of role in a THEA 260 production or similar performance deemed appropriate by instructor.

Student Learning Outcomes

1. Demonstrate skill in chosen role's duties in a professional theatrical production.



- 2. Communicate effectively with Director and fellow cast and crew members in discipline specific language and terminology.
- 3. Execute all duties of chosen role in a live theatrical performance.

## **THEA 220 (Beginning Voice and Movement)**

3 credits

Introduction to vocal and movement techniques to increase self-awareness and potential for self-expression. May be repeated up to 6 credits. Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Demonstrate awareness of personal habits, tensions and methods for releasing them, and physical and vocal preferences.
- 2. Execute a wide variety of warmup and performance tools.
- 3. Perform pieces with self-expression through vocal and physical choices.

## THEA 221 (Acting I)

3 credits

Performance course concentrating on voice, relaxation, body awareness, and freedom from self-consciousness through theatre games, improvisation, and exercises. Emphasis on ensemble work. Students must see two plays and write about them or use the Service-Learning option. May be repeated up to 9 credits. Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Articulate and project the voice well.
- 2. Devise and execute improvisations.
- 3. Explore dramatic one and two person scenes
- 4. Identify, analyze and critically evaluate the technique and believability of dramatic performances.

#### THEA 222 (Acting II)

3 credits

Performance course concentrating on exploration of character creation; continued work on voice, relaxation, and self-realization. Students must see two plays and write about them or use the Service-Learning option. May be repeated up to 9 credits. Pre-Requisites: Grade of "C" or better in THEA 221. Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Articulate and project the voice well.
- 2. Devise and execute improvisations.
- 3. Explore dramatic one and two person scenes
- 4. Identify, analyze and critically evaluate the technique and believability of dramatic performances.

#### **CM/THEA 223 (Introduction to Acting for Camera)**



3 credits

An introduction to acting techniques for film, TV production, and other camerabased media. Repeatable up to 6 credits.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Demonstrate the skill of acting by using the camera lens to convey story.
- 2. Illustrate the complexities of character within a given text.
- 3. Analyze performances for television and film for quality and desired effect on the audience.

## THEA 225 (Shakespeare Workshop)

3 credits

A study of William Shakespeare's life, works, contemporary performance practices, and the Royal Shakespeare Company's current training and methods of bringing the Bard's work to life for modern audiences. The curriculum of this course is tailored to the Royal Shakespeare Company's Summer Season, and this course serves as mandatory preparation for the WCC Footholds Shakespeare Study Abroad program to London and Stratford-upon-Avon. May be repeated up to 6 credits.

- Student Learning Outcomes
  - 1. Analyze Shakespeare's use of meter and poetry.
  - 2. Replicate Shakespeare's Contemporary Performance Practices
  - 3. Deliver Shakespeare's Poetic Text with skillful use of jambic pentameter.
  - 4. Perform Scenes and Monologues from some of Shakespeare's great roles.

#### THEA 251 (Applied Theatre) x2

1 credit (x2 = 2 credits)

This course provides individual instruction in theatre, covering intermediate and advanced performance techniques taught to each student's individual level. Applied theatre is a performance course. The emphasis will be toward developing performing skills from a wide range of methods focusing on bringing characters to vivid life, textual analysis, cold reading, voice and movement training, and playing truthful and effective moments on stage or screen for a contemporary audience. The goal is to facilitate student actors in attaining a level of confidence and skill that allows for consistently powerful and playful performances. This course may be repeated for up to 4 credits. Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Incorporate theoretical concepts in theatrical performance.
- 2. Cold read scripts with commitment, and strong appropriate characterdriven choices.
- 3. Demonstrate professional performance practices.



## **THEA 252 (Professional Preparation)**

1 credit

This course provides individual instruction in theatre, covering necessary professional skills and resources to facilitate student performers' transition into the professional performing arts industry. Students will learn audition best practices, procure headshots, build a resume, and cultivate a repertoire of audition pieces. This course may be repeated for up to 4 credits. Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Research and contact casting directors, agents, companies and studios.
- 2. Generate self-promotional materials.
- 3. Prepare slates, monologues and other audition pieces.
- 4. Demonstrate professional performance practices.

## **THEA 260 (Dramatic Production)**

3 credits

Introduction to the process of converting a play into a performance. Students are required to participate in at least two aspects of an actual production. May be repeated up to 9 credits.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Identify key theatrical terms and concepts.
- 2. Critically evaluate a theatrical event.
- 3. Demonstrate professionalism in one particular area of theatrical production.

#### iv. Description of demand and social value of the program

The Certificate of Achievement: Foundation in Acting is a one year, cohort-based talent development program that is unique in the UH System (no overlap with any other programs system-wide). Foundation in Acting mirrors similar Certificates of Higher Education (commonly called Foundation Year programs) found in conservatories and top-flight drama schools the world over.

The Foundation in Acting focuses on a suite of courses developed to prime novitiate actors for entering the workforce with their best foot forward, forearmed with specific career-oriented training, industry-standard knowledge and industry-standard skills and credentials. The courses prepare students for a wide array of employment opportunities on stage, on screen (in television/film/streaming), in the writer's room, or as creators of their own original content for user-generated platforms.

This Foundation in Acting CA is modeled most closely on East 15 Acting School's Foundation Year, but with special consideration and adjustments made to best serve our local population of performers-in-training and the viable pathways into the entertainment industry here on-island. As no program of this ilk exists in the islands, our department feels this fills a need that students would otherwise be forced to travel to the mainland or abroad to attain.

This one-year Foundation in Acting develops talent for local productions and provides students in the islands with the skills needed to audition for professional troupes, casting directors, agents, and well-respected conservatories (to continue their training if they so choose). Agents and casting directors on-island face a dearth of locally developed talent in the form of well trained, professionally prepared performers, and most of the major film and television productions shot in the islands import the majority of their talent from agencies on the continent. These jobs could be in the hands of our local graduates instead.

East 15 Acting School (the top conservatoire in the UK) has agreed to recognize this certificate as the equivalent of their Foundation in Theatre Certificate in Higher Education program, and are also willing to accredit this new credential externally (students would earn their Foundation in Theatre and our Foundation in Acting at the same time).

# v. Description of resources needed, including budget, personnel, and facilities.

Palikū Theatre on Windward Community College's campus along with the many resources available in the Humanities department already possesses most of the resources required for delivery of this program, though at present the theatre resides under CCE.



The administration and all stakeholders have supported a reorganization of the theatre from CCE to Academic Support, so that this venue can support this program and other performance-related disciplines (Dance, Hawaiian Studies, Music, and other Theatre programs).

Additionally, at the start of the pandemic the Theatre Manager position was swept. The last manager had retired and we were mid-hiring of his replacement when the pandemic hit. This position is necessary for the delivery of this new Certificate of Achievement. We requested it last academic year through our campus Planning and Budget Council. It was approved and we are forwarding a Critical to Fill memorandum up through the ranks of administration to get this permanent position restored (we currently have a temporary Manager filling in).
