440 Advanced Philosophy of Religion (3)

A study of the current philosophical conversations about religion between Existentialists, Linguistic Analysts, Neo Catholics, Neo Orthodox, the Process Philosophers and the Secular Theologians. Pre: RelSt 300 or Phil 240, 6 hours at 300 level.

494 Special Topics in Religious Studies (1-3)

Advanced topics chosen by the instructor — the course content will vary. It may be repeated for credit, provided that a different topic is studied. Pre: Senior standing and consent of instructor.

499 Directed Studies (1-3)

Permission of instructor and statement of planned reading or research required. Pre: Senior standing and consent of instructor.

Ocean 201 Science of the Sea (3)

Descriptive introduction to oceanography: basic physical and chemical features of the sea; characteristics of the biotic community and interrelationships with the environment; man and the sea.

SOCIAL SCIENCE

Professor: T. Smuck

Major: 30 hours of upper division work (300-400)

- 9 semester hours from any three of the following disciplines: Anthropology, Economics, Geography, History, Political Science, Psychology, and Sociology.

100 General Sociology (3)

Introduction to the traditional perspectives, concepts, and methods of sociology.

240 Individual and Society (3)

The interrelations between the individual and the social milieu within which he functions. Pre: Soc 100.

260 Social Problems (3)

Focuses on problems such as poverty, deviance, and prejudice. Pre: Soc 100.

290 Social Processes in Hawaii (3)

Contemporary and historical social patterns in Hawaii. Pre: Soc 100.

300 Marriage (3)

A sociological analysis of marriage in America and other societies — with emphasis on husband/wife interaction. Pre: Soc 100.

305 Sociology of Business (3)

The social interactions involved in business activity in American society — the interrelationships of business, culture, and social institutions. Pre: Soc 100.

340 Socialization and Identity (3)

The process by which an individual becomes a functioning member of society. Pre: Soc 100.

360 Crime and Delinquency (3)

The sociological study of crime and delinquency — types of adult and juvenile offenders — theories of crime and delinquency — police, courts, prisons, probation, and parole in relation to criminal and delinquent behavior. Pre: Soc 100.

380 Methods of Social Research (3)

The basic techniques of empirical research in sociology. Pre: Soc 100 and at least two other courses in sociology. 200B

385 Sociological Statistics (3)

The statistical procedures of special relevance for empirical research in sociology. Pre: Soc 100 and at least two other courses in sociology.

390 Sociological Theory (3)

The major sociological theorists of today and the past. Pre: Soc 100 and at least two other courses in sociology.

394 Special Topics in Sociology (1-3)

Topics chosen by the instructor — the course content will vary. It may be repeated for credit, provided that a different topic is studied. Pre: Junior standing and consent of the instructor.

399 Directed Studies (1-3)

Permission of instructor and statement of planned reading or research required. Pre: Junior standing and consent of instructor.

405 Occupations and Professions (3)

Sociological analysis of the occupations and professions of American society — the interrelationships of work and lifestyle. Pre: Soc 380, 385, and 390.

425 Community Studies (3)

Focuses on political and economic power structures, the sociological ramifications of community, and rural/urban contrasts. Pre: Soc 380, 385, and 390.

440 Personality and Social Structure (3)

Personality and life-style in relation to culture and social structure. Pre: Soc 380, 385, 390.

460 Social Deviance (3)

The sociological analysis of deviance in America; e.g., mental illness, drug use, suicide. Pre: Soc 380, 385, 390.

480 Biosociology (3)

Fertility, maturation and aging, eating and drinking habits, sex behavior, health, sickness and mortality in sociological perspective. Pre: Soc 380, 385, 390.

494 Special Topics in Sociology (1-3)

Advanced topics chosen by the instructor. The course content will vary. It may be repeated for credit, provided that a different topic is studied. Pre: Senior standing and consent of instructor.

499 Directed Studies (1-3)

Permission of instructor and statement of planned reading or research required. Pre: Senior standing and consent of instructor.

SPEECH (Sp) BA-SPCH

Major: 30 semester hours
