The Academic Subject Certificate in Global Studies supports the **Mission** of Leeward Community College (2012/2013 College Catalog) in the following areas:

Vision: Leeward Community College is a learning-centered institution committed to student achievement.

Mission: At Leeward Community College, we work together to nurture and inspire all students. We help them attain their goals through high-quality liberal arts and career and technical education. We foster students to become responsible global citizens locally, nationally, and internationally. We advance the educational goals of all students with a special commitment to Native Hawaiians.

These **core values** shape Leeward Community College's mission:

We value cooperation, collaboration, social responsibility, and concern for others as crucial elements in building a sense of community inside and outside of the institution.

Diversity and respect

We value individual differences and the contributions they bring to the learning process. To acknowledge the need to prepare Leeward CC students to be globally conscious, internationally engaged citizens and to support all University of Hawai'i (UH) System and Leeward Community College documents (Mission statements, strategic plans) that have similar goals.

WHEREAS, the University of Hawai'i System *Mission Statement and Strategic Directions for International Engagement,* 2010-2020 calls for all of its campuses "to make the University of Hawai'i a preeminent center of international learning"; and

WHEREAS, it continues to state all campuses "should enhance, intensify, expand and diversify their international activities"; and

WHEREAS, it further affirms the University's need to foster "among students and faculty global perspectives and attitudes"; and

WHEREAS, Leeward CC documents such as the strategic plan and mission statement are in alignment with the UH System's *Mission Statement* where all emphasize in various ways the importance of the global environment and economies, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Leeward CC Faculty Senate expresses support of international/global education for the benefit of all faculty and students who are dedicated to upholding the UH System's *Mission Statement* and implementing its strategic directives; and

Be It Further RESOLVED, that the Leeward CC Faculty Senate strongly encourages the Leeward CC Administration to endorse and support international/global education to bring the Leeward CC campus into alignment with the University of Hawai'i System *Mission Statement and Strategic Directions for International Engagement, 2010-2020*.

2. What are the outcomes of the program? (outcomes should be stated in terms of meeting student, community or State needs. Also includes Program Learning Outcomes.)

The Academic Subject Certificate in Global Studies gives students a solid foundation for success in transferring to bachelor's degree programs. It prepares students to meet the challenges of an interconnected and interdependent world as globally conscious and internationally engaged citizens. Upon completing the certificate, students will be able to:

- 1. Evaluate the growing interconnectedness of people and places through expanding economic, political and cultural activities.
- 2. Analyze the factors that promote and shape the international exchange of goods and services.
- 3. Critique the unique historical trajectories of different world regions and the complex political and cultural contexts of contemporary global issues.
- 4. Recognize the diversity of the arts and their role in advancing universal understanding.
- 5. Use second language skills to demonstrate cross-cultural knowledge and appreciation.
- 3. How is the program organized to meet its outcomes? (Description of curriculum organization, requirements, admission policies, advising and counseling, and other aspects of the program, with reference to its outcomes.)

The Academic Subject Certificate in Global Studies will total 18-20 credits. Students will select five courses (15-16 credits) from the core requirements and one course (3-4 credits) from the list of electives (any of the core courses not previously selected as one of the core requirements may be taken as an elective).

There are no program entrance requirements prescribed for this certificate, but individual course prerequisities apply. A faculty member will be assigned to adivse and counsel students in the certificate program.

4. Who will enroll in the program? (Special target groups, if any; number of majors expected by year for first five years; expected service to non-majors; evidence of student interest.)

A survey during Fall 2011 of 507 students found that 50%, or 255 students, would be very interested in completing the Academic Subject Certificate in Global Studies. This would be a high number of graduates for an academic subject certificate at Leeward Community College.

Target groups include students looking to add an international perspective and become more globally conscious and internationally engaged citizens, students enrolled in foreign language classes, students participating in a study abroad program and students seeking to improve their employability and career advancement in the tourism industry, private industry, and government agencies.

For students wishing to pursue a career in international business and intent on transferring to the UH Manoa School of Business, it is highly recommended that they complete four semesters of a foreign language while completing their AA. The ASC in Global Studies would be an added distinction for such students. In addition there are several high schools in Hawaii offering the International Baccalaureate Diploma program including Henry J. Kaiser High School, James Campbell High School, Le Jardin Academy and Mid-Pacific Institute. The International Baccalaureate is a non-profit foundation working with schools to "help develop the intellectual, personal, emotional and social skills to live learn and work in a rapidly globalizing world." (http://www.ibo.org/general/who.cfm) This is part of a growing trend at the high school level and Leeward CC must be prepared to satisfy the needs of graduates from these programs.

5. What resources are required for program implementation and first five-year cycle operation? (Number, source, and cost of faculty; library requirements; support personnel; estimated cost of supplies, equipment and CIP; facilities to be utilized; total funds required for program implementation and operation; expected source of funds, including sources of reallocated funds.)

No additional resources will be needed to implement the program. The College currently offers all of the courses that are included in the proposed Academic Subject Certificate.

6. How efficient will the program be? (Compare anticipated cost per SSH, cost per major, SSH/faculty, average class size or other quantitative measures with other programs in the college and similar programs on other UH campuses.)

The program will be very efficient since it requires no additional resources. All of the courses in the certificate are already offered by the College.

7. How will effectiveness of the program be demonstrated? (Projected number of graduates yearly; placement of graduates; special accreditation; student satisfaction; career and employer satisfaction, etc.)

One measure of effectiveness would be the number of students graduating with an Academic Subject Certificate in Global Studies each year. A survey during Fall 2011 of 507 students found that 50%, or 255 students, would be very interested in completing the Academic Subject Certificate in Global Studies. This would be a high number of graduates for an academic subject certificate at Leeward Community College and would signal a successful program. Another important measure of effectiveness would be the extent to which the Academic Subject Certificate in Global Studies to other College-wide initiatives to internationalize the curriculum at Leeward Community College.
