Re: Modifications to the Academic Subject Certificate in Hawaiian Studies

On Monday, November 28, 2011, Kalani Meinecke, Keliko Hoe, and Kalawaia Moore met to discuss changes to the ASC in Hawaiian Studies. We came up with the following changes that we agreed address some problems we have seen with our current ASC. We also want to incorporate the new courses and areas of focus that have emerged since the inception of the ASC.

1) Classes that fulfill the area core requirements are not always available.

We have had to write a number of "letters of exception" over the past few years to allow for substitute classes to count as area core requirements. Under the current ASC in the History/Culture area, the core requirement HIST 284 is not always offered, and HWST 270 and REL 205 are offered only once each full academic year.

In the Science area, the IS 160 and IS 260 are only offered every other year, and in fact, these courses were not offered as a two class sequence two years ago meaning that no one was eligible to attain an ASC in Hawaiian Studies in the area emphasis of Science for several years. The new changes requested remedy this issue by expanding the classes available that count toward each of these two area core requirements.

2) We have several new courses that expand upon our current ASC areas, and have lent themselves to the changing and creation of additional areas of emphasis.

First, we have changed the Science area to an Ahupua'a area and incorporated more classes that touch upon Hawaiian land and ocean systems for our students to choose from to meet the area core requirements.

Second, we have added two new areas of emphasis that have emerged based on the new courses that have been created in recent years. The two new areas are Hawaiian Performing Arts, and Hawaiian Visual Art and Design.

We think these changes work in the best interest of our students and give greater coherence to the Hawaiian Studies discipline at WCC. We look forward to any questions anyone might have regarding the changes we are requesting.

The HWST ASC changes mean we are now offering five different possible ASCs. Currently we offer three different ASCs (Hawaiian Language, History/Culture, and Science). So what we are doing is offering two more additional ASCs (Hawaiian Performing Arts, Hawaiian Visual Arts) and changing the names on the other three ('Ōlelo Hawai'i, Mo'olelo Hawai'i, Ahupua'a: Hawaiian land and ocean systems). The ASC is still available for students and community members who want to only take Hawaiian studies courses without pursuing the larger AA degree.
