1. SPECIFIC ACTION REQUESTED: Approval of a Concentration in Education

Program Description:

The A.A. degree in Liberal Arts with a Concentration in Education prepares students to transfer to four-year institutions. This 60-credit program satisfies all of the requirements for the A.A. degree in Liberal Arts and also provides students with solid knowledge and skills to be successful in entering a university teacher education program in Elementary Education and Special Education. It provides students with an understanding of the school system and its diverse student population in Hawai'i, the process in becoming a certified teacher in Hawai'i, the special education system and its governing laws, classroom management and instruction, innovative ways to use technology to enhance students' learning, and best practices and methods in teaching. It also affords students numerous opportunities to research and debate current issues and challenges in Education, advocate for students and their families, and engage in numerous field experiences with working with preK-12 students in classroom settings. It further creates a pathway for those students interested in pursuing other education-related careers. Targeted advising and a carefully planned course sequence enable students to successfully transfer to baccalaureate institutions in Hawaii that have education-related majors, such as the University of Hawaii at Manoa, College of Education.

Program Learning Outcomes for the Liberal Arts Degree:

- 1. Make effective decisions with intellectual integrity to solve problems and/or achieve goals utilizing the skills of critical thinking, creative thinking, information literacy, and quantitative/symbolic reasoning.
- 2. Ethically, compose, convey, and interpret varied perspectives with respect to an intended audience using visual, oral, written, social, and other forms of communication.
- 3. Evaluate one's own ethics and traditions in relation to those of other peoples and embrace the diversity of human experience while actively engaging in local, regional, and global communities.
- 4. Through various modes of inquiry, demonstrate how aesthetics engage the human experience, revealing the interconnectedness of knowledge and life.
- 5. Explore and synthesize knowledge, attitudes, and skills from a variety of cultural and academic perspectives to enhance our local and global communities.

Student Learning Outcomes for the Concentration in Education:

- 1. Use informed decision making to function effectively in the classroom, school, local, and/or professional communities.
- 2. Use communication skills to work effectively with students, their families, school administrators, teachers, staff, and other related personnel.

- 3. Use instructional and behavioral management strategies to facilitate a positive learning environment for students.
- 4. Demonstrate professionalism and ethical practices in the classroom, school, local, and professional communities.
- 5. Demonstrate knowledge and skills specific to the instruction and support of students in a variety of settings.

2. RECOMMENDED EFFECTIVE DATE: Fall 2013

- 3. **PURPOSE:** The purpose of the Concentration in Education is to create a clear pathway for students interested in transferring to a 4-year institute with a Bachelor's degree in the area of Elementary Education and Special Education.
- 4. **SPECIFIC ISSUES:** The demand for teachers in the nation has increased dramatically; hence, the need to prepare students as teachers has become quite imperative. While student enrollments are rising rapidly, more than a million veteran teachers are nearing retirement. Experts predict that overall the U.S. will need more than 2 million new teachers in the next decade, particularly for high-need areas such as special education and secondary education. Additionally, low pay and new requirements for more schooling may cause educational paraprofessionals to retire early or change careers. Therefore, a shortage in educational paraprofessionals may occur simultaneously with a teacher shortage (NEA, 2007, http://www.nea.org/espcolumns/dv020910.html).

Hawai'i is not immune to these shortages. With the enrollment of 178,649 students in the 2009-2010 school year, reflecting an increase of nearly 800 students from the previous year, the Hawai'i Department of Education (HIDOE) is experiencing a critical shortage of teachers. An article by the Star Advertiser, dated 07/11/10, stated that the HIDOE typically hires approximately 1,500 new teachers each year, but last year, they have hired an average of 800 teachers, leaving 700 vacancies. The number of college students who completed a teacher education program and qualified for licensure from the University of Hawaii's College of Education and Hawaii Pacific University in 2010 was 149 and 20 respectively. The shortages are the largest in secondary education, special education, and Hawaiian Language (Hawaii News Now, August 2012). According to the HIDOE Superintendant's Annual Report (2010), students with special needs constituted 55% of the student population enrolled in Hawaii public schools. Furthermore, according to Ashbaker & Morgan (2005), on average, at least five educational paraprofessionals per school are working in or are needed to work in special education assignments. With the movement toward inclusion (having both children with and without disabilities educated in the same classroom), more teachers and paraprofessionals will be needed. In Hawaii, by 2015 all elementary schools in the Honolulu district will be required to have inclusive classrooms (Denise Yamashiro, 9/17/2011, Honolulu District, Special Education Department Chair, Kuhio Elementary School), compounding the demand even further.

5. BACKGROUND AND CONSEQUENCES: In 2002, Kapi'olani Community College (KCC) made a commitment to support the State in addressing the demand for teachers and educational paraprofessionals by creating the very first Teacher Preparation Coordinator/Instructor position in the State. That same year, KCC's first teacher preparation program, TEACH (Teacher Education for All Children) Hawaii was established.

On February 20, 2004, the Board of Regents approved the A.S. Degree for Educational Paraprofessionals. It was the first of its kind in the State. This degree had two emphases: Special Education (SPED) & Deaf and Hard of Hearing (DHH). The intent of these two degree programs was to prepare and support educational paraprofessionals (as well as other interested students) to meet the

mandates of President Bush's "No Child Left Behind" (NCLB) Act of 2001. However, in Spring 2010, a stop-out notice was issued for these degree programs.

In Fall 2010, the TEACH Hawaii program became the Center on Responsive Education (CORE). The name change was necessary to reflect its comprehensive teacher preparation support and services to students. CORE is a collaborative partnership of four KCC programs – Education, Second Language Teaching, Deaf Education, and Educational Interpreting – that prepares students for various educational settings and/or transfer to baccalaureate programs. CORE's primary goal is to produce graduates who are educationally, culturally, and linguistically responsive to individual and group needs by creating an Ecology of Engaged Learning. This goal duly aligns with KCC's Strategic Plan 2008-2015 to develop a new ecology of engaged learning and teaching for degree completion and transfer by improving programs that meet critical workforce shortages in teaching (p. 40).

In 2011, two grants were funded to enhance the four programs and support students with scholarships. The first grant, "Strengthening the CORE" is a 4-year \$600,000 program improvement grant. The second grant, "CORE 1+1" is a 4-year \$1,200,000 grant supporting students from Hawai'i and Pacific jurisdictions who are pursuing degrees at KCC in one of the CORE programs. Another component of the Strengthening the CORE program improvement grant is the funding of a state-of-the-art CORE Teaching and Learning Lab that will provide support for students in all four CORE programs.

The Concentration in Education was conceived to respond to the frequent and ongoing requests to expand opportunities for students interested in education majors, and a serious and persistent need for to alleviate the teacher shortage in Hawaii. Furthermore, students who were obtaining the A.S. Degree found it to be an obstacle in transferring to the College of Education (COE) at UH Manoa. The Concentration in Education will support a seamless and smooth transfer for students and recognize them as Education majors.
